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Climb Scotland FUN Competition formerly known as the Scottish Schools Competition.


396 young people from all over Scotland took part in the competition which runs at 12 climbing walls around Scotland during October. Climbers have to complete 4 climbs; they are allowed 3 attempts at each climb. Their scores are then submitted nationally in the corresponding age groups. Both Sean Dunnett and Gavin Rendall scored the maximum

400 points in their categories and qualified for the Grand Final in Aberdeen

along with another 112 climbers from across Scotland.

50 Orcadian young people entered the competition, 5 from Shapinsay. They scored: Gavin Rendall scored 400 points gualifying for the final, 1<sup>st</sup> in Orkney – Youth C. Jennifer Meason scored 358 points 31st in Scotland, 4th in Orkney Youth D. Erland Rendall scored 393 points coming 15<sup>th</sup> in Scotland and 2<sup>nd</sup> in Orkney – Youth D. Sean Dunnett scored 400 points qualifying for the final, 1<sup>st</sup> in Orkney – Youth D. Matthew Meason scored 336 points, 19th in Scotland, 5th in Orkney - Youth E





**Gavin** and **Sean** travelled to Aberdeen to compete on the 17<sup>th</sup> November. They both had to complete 2 climbs in the morning semi-final. The Aberdeen wall is 15m tall – quite a daunting prospect when you are standing at the bottom compared to the Picky's 8m (from a spectator's point of view at least).

**Gavin** competed in Youth C. Gavin climbed well against strong competition in the morning scoring 150 points. It was an extremely close competition with the second route proving a challenge to all the climbers. Gavin says "I enjoyed watching the other competitors climb. The wall was a lot higher than the one at Picky and had a lot more features."





**Sean** competed in Youth D. Sean scored 200 points qualifying for the final in the afternoon. There was added tension as the climbers were kept in isolation. They were only given 4 minutes to look at the route, then held in isolation so they could not observe the others' attempts at the route. Sean scored 100 points in the final, the only one in his group to reach the top of the wall. It was a heart stopping 5 minutes 58.5 seconds watching him climb. The time limit is 6 minutes! Each climb is graded and this one was a 6C+ which means really hard! This is the first 6C+ Sean has topped. Sean said "I like the higher wall, just takes me

longer to get to the top. The last climb was hard!" He was pleased to win and thinks his jumper is cool!



Orkney Climbing Club also won the Top Club award scoring 1354.5 points with 16 young people attending the Final from Orkney.

Following Voluntary Action Orkney's visit to Shapinsay last month, we are in the process of setting up a steering group. There will be a meeting on 11<sup>th</sup> December at 7.30pm for anyone interested in joining the steering group. At this meeting we will finalise the dates and forms for the application process, voting procedures and the final presentation event. It is likely that the closing date for application forms will be late January with a presentation event and voting in February.

This time we have over £5000 in our funding pot so if you'd like to have a think about what YIYC2 could fund, your project needs to fit in with one of 5 priorities - Digital Connectivity, Work & Local Economies, Influence & Engagement, Getting Around and Housing & Communities.

### **Garden Notes from Old School**



As the year 2018 draws to a close and we take a break from gardening for a while the garden too takes a rest, the plants putting all their energy into what goes on underground in preparation for their performance next season.

Generally I like to leave the last of the dead flower heads in place for as long as possible so the birds can enjoy the seeds, but as soon as they have been stripped it's time to cut them down, tidy up and mulch. Some seed heads are attractive in their own right; the flat heads of sedum and the papery spikes of catmints give an extra dimension to the garden when the flowers have finished.





Some plants are prolific self—seeders such as marjoram and lady's mantle and these seed heads are best removed to save additional work in the spring when small seedlings will be popping up everywhere. Other more special plants are allowed to drop their seed which germinates readily in the gravel mulch; the purple-leaved cow parsley Anthriscus 'Raven's Wing' and any of the sea hollies are in this category for me. I like gravel as a mulch; it warms quickly in the sun, stops mud splashing up over smaller plants, keeps the weeds at bay and is a good medium to show off the plants.

This autumn I have finally planted up an area that has taken a long time to prepare. It used to be a small lawn that was extremely difficult to reach with the mower and was waterlogged in winter. The level has now been raised by mixing in loads, and I mean loads, many many barrow loads, of composted garden waste from Hatston and grit. The result is in effect a raised bed with good drainage so I am hopeful that my little treasures will thrive. Incidentally, if anyone can identify this spiky plant I would be most grateful; I grew it from seed then promptly lost the label and have no idea what it will turn out to be!





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### Garden Notes Part 2



Some plants that go unnoticed during summer suddenly come into their own when the distraction of flowers has passed. Junipers are a native conifer and do well here; the prostrate varieties such as J. 'Green Carpet,' slowly but surely increase in size and spread their intricate, feathery foliage across the ground. Bergenias do a similar thing. Once the flowers have finished and the dead spikes removed they will gradually cover the soil with their leathery 'elephant ears' leaves which as a bonus, take on a reddish tinge when the temperature drops. Acaena 'Purpurea', although on a smaller scale, creeps along throwing out spindly arms which then become clothed with its attractive bronze coloured leaves.








I am delighted that this year we have seen Song Thrushes in the garden. Whilst weeding on a still day this summer, I heard a sound that I haven't heard for a long time; a snail being hammered against a stone to smash the shell and reveal the tasty morsel inside. Is it a coincidence or simply the way nature works that this is also the first year I have seen the large Garden Snails with brown shells that thrushes love to eat. Right now the snails should be hibernating but I will be quite happy to see them again next year if it also means that we have thrushes in the garden.

Over the last three years that I have been writing these articles the garden has changed a lot and I like to think that we now have more protective cover and sources of food for all sorts of wildlife. A garden is always evolving and I imagine that in another three years it will look quite different again. However, for the moment, I am pleased with what we have achieved and happy that it is a place for wildlife to flourish and for us to enjoy.

# Winter Warmers Season Starting Soon 🦠



Soond Cinema is coming towards the end of its first pilot 10 film season, a season which has involved a terrifyingly steep learning curve on the technology and film licensing front for both Lynne and myself, resulting in a few rather mortifying technical glitches in the early days but we are finally getting there. Many thanks to our supportive audiences for your patience, technology tips and for continuing to come back for more!

Being invited to be one of the participating venues in Orkney's recent Film Focus Festival was a huge surprise and a real privilege as this invitation came with funding for a one-off public cinema licence. This allowed us to show, and advertise, *The World's Fastest Indian*, a Kiwi movie starring Anthony Hopkins, on the festival's opening night, a film which we would not ordinarily have been able to show under the SDT's MPLC umbrella charity licence. Two of the Kiwi films which Soond Cinema has already shown earlier in the year were selected by West Side Cinema in Stromness and North Ronaldsay's Community cinema as the films they wanted to show at their respective venues during the film festival. Good to know that Shapinsay is up there with the best of them!

As the long winter nights begin to draw in, Soond Cinema is planning to launch a second pilot, a 5 film *Winter Warmers* season, which will overlap with the final 2 movies of our current *Kiwi* film season, giving folk the opportunity to attend fortnightly movies from December to March. The *Winter Warmers* will include a mixed bag of comedies, romances, non-narrative documentaries, musicals and true stories to help chase away the winter blues.

The *Kiwi* film season will draw to a close with the showing of a drama based on a true story on Thursday 6<sup>th</sup> December 2018 and a quirky romantic comedy on Thursday 10<sup>th</sup> January 2019. **The** *Winter Warmers* season will start on Thursday 20<sup>th</sup> December 2018 with a zany American comedy, the only movie which has ever made me cry from laughing.
