Nursery

The children have been playing with dolls, exploring paint. They have loved doing obstacle courses and playing with the parachute in the hall. Bookbug was very popular. Robots has been a particular interest with their children making their own Nursery robot, Bebe. They are starting a project on minibeasts.

<u>P1-4</u>

The children have been continuing to learn about Vikings, learning about



longhouses and longships. They have been learning about what life was like in Viking times and been writing in role as Vikings. They really enjoyed Barry's visit for Up

Helly Aa! In French the children have been continuing to learn about transport as well as revising information about themselves.



In PE this term the children have been using apparatus in gymnastics to go over, under, around, through and across. They have created obstacle courses for themselves and for the nursery. We have also been exploring fun ways to keep ourselves fit, healthy and active in our "Fun fitness" sessions, this has included learning action rhymes, using the parachute and playing active games.

<u>P5-7</u>

In Health and Wellbeing, the P5-7 children are investigating the different careers, occupations and ways of working that they might choose when they are older. They've also been learning out about what people can do in college, university or apprenticeships. In Social Studies, they learnt about Anne Frank and the Holocaust. Technologies work has included work on internet safety; how the internet influences us and some of the different types of persuasive design used. They have used a block-based, visual programming language to create computer programs. English lessons have focused on techniques authors use for characterisation in stories.

In PE this term the children have been using the gymnastics apparatus to create varied routines, exploring pathways and transitions. They have been doing some solo work, but are now moving onto work with a partner, exploring mirroring, counter balance and counter tension in our routines.

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SHAPINSAY HORTICULTURAL ASSOCIATION NEWS

There was an excellent turnout for our most recent event on 24th January which explored the subject of The Garden In Winter, a somewhat ironic topic as the event had to be postponed for a week due to heavy snow! The evening began with a presentation looking at plants that can provide interest during the winter period. There may not be many flowers at this time of year but many plants can provide colour and interest in other ways. This might be shrubs and trees with coloured bark, evergreens with variegated leaves or shrubs which reveal interesting shapes and forms when stripped bare of leaves. There is no reason why a garden should be dull during the winter months.

After enjoying refreshments which included some very tasty home-bakes, the raffle was drawn with all prizes being related to seeds and seed sowing. The remainder of the evening was spent browsing through numerous packets of flower and vegetable seed which had been brought along on the night, and for a small donation, choosing something to take home to grow this year. Many thanks as always to everyone who helped on the night and particularly the bakers!

Our next social event will take place on **Wednesday 10th April**. Full details for this event will be provided in the next edition of The Shapinsay Sound, together with our usual posters and postings on social media, so look out for this nearer the time. We can confirm however, that this event will include the relaunching of our famous "Tattie In A Bucket" competition, which this year will see all aspiring competitors provided with both seed potatoes and buckets to grow them in, with judging to take place at a social event in the autumn.

Before this however, we will be holding a special meeting on **Wednesday 27th March** to examine whether there is sufficient interest and support to

hold an annual show this year and if so, what form this might take. You may remember that in our Shapinsay Sound article last October, we explained that there was dwindling support for running the annual show, which at that point was the only activity we ran, seemed likely to spell the end of the Horticultural Association.

However, it was decided that instead, the whole focus of the Association should change to provide a number of activities throughout the year, which would provide anyone with an interest in gardening/horticulture the opportunity to get together to share and develop those interests, with the annual show being just one of those activities, with a decision made each year on whether it can be held, depending on the level of support at that time.

At the meeting, we will examine what is involved in running a full show as has taken place previously, breaking down the various tasks and resources needed at given points to perform them. This will give everyone a full understanding to enable an informed discussion of what may or may not be possible and if a decision to hold a show of some sort is reached, which tasks attendees would be prepared to undertake. As an example, on show day itself, a certain number of people are required to support the judging of each class at the same time. Therefore, if you have half the number of classes, you only need half the number of people supporting. A show can potentially be whatever we want it to be, everything is up for discussion!

We would therefore ask everyone who wishes to support holding a show this year to come to the meeting on **Wednesday 27th March** so that a decision can be made as to what type of show, (if any), will be held and preparations can begin.

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Shapinsay Development Trust News

A fair bit has happened in the last month, since the last edition of the Shapinsay Sound.

Rulinvoe: On the 7th of February, the grant payment from Scottish Land Fund for £145000 came through, the property was signed over to SDT on the 9th of February, thank you to Gillian Harbour for offering us the opportunity to purchase her house.



We ran the tender process towards the end of last year and awarded the successful tender the contract in December (??) so that we were ready to commence renovations as soon as the property changed hands. Darren Muir Joinery was awarded the contract and work commenced on the 12th of February and as you will see by the photos below, the stripping back is well under way. For those of you that aren't aware, the property was damaged by fire in 2021 and the top floor was renovated through the insurance, so it's mainly the ground floor that needs extensive renovations, with only a couple of small changes required on the first floor. We will keep you updated with progress.





It is important that we get a family allocated to the property as soon as possible, ideally with minimum of 3 primary school age children to keep the school roll up above the capacity for 2 teachers. An allocation policy will be created very soon and within the next couple of weeks, we will begin this process of recruiting a family who would be hopefully ready to move by August.



Below is the funding breakdown for the whole project, (based on current projected costs, these costs may be subject to change if anything crops up that was unforeseen during the renovation process):

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Last week we were awarded £31000 from the Community Development Fund toward the purchase of a portacabin for a charity shop, along with a £15000 grant from Highlands and Islands enterprise and a grant of £9000 from CLLD. We hope to purchase the portacabin in the next few days, although delivery may take up to 3 months.

We ran a community coffee afternoon on the 13th of February with around 30 people attending for coffee, a chat, some pancakes and crafts! We will host another on the 27th of March (see poster for details). It's a great opportunity to have a chat with your Wellbeing Coordinator (Alison McDougall) and your Community Development Officer (Lisa-Marie Muir) if you have any ideas or anything you'd like to share or discuss.

Alison has facilitated the startup of the men's shed, which is now fairly well established. The group intend to set up a SCIO (Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation), this will allow them to apply for funding themselves and have complete ownership of the project. If any men out there are interested in being part of this project, see the poster for details on attending a meeting.

Rural Housing Conference: Davie Campbell and I were at the Rural Housing Conference 2024 in Aviemore last week where we Davie and Luke Frazer had the opportunity to get up on stage and tell them all what fantastic work is being done here in Orkney and we had lots of people asking for advice! We met some great like-minded people there and realised how great it is that we have such a great relationship between our local council and our development trusts, it makes what we do so much easier. Many haven't got that relationship and are hitting many stumbling blocks on the way. This relationship has taken a lot of work from a few people over the years, and we hope that it can continue long into the future. The housing minister Paul McLennan was on stage talking about housing budgets, strategies and hurdles. He was in Orkney the week before and spoke very highly on stage and in the strategy meeting the day before, of what we are achieving in Shapinsay and in Orkney as a whole. Unfortunately, it looks like budgets for HIE, Scottish Land Fund, and the Rural housing fund will be significantly cut in the next while, so projects will have to fight harder for a smaller slice of the funding,

thankfully we got significant funding in the last round for Rulinvoe.



There is no progress to update on Balfour Cottage, we await news from planning, so there won't be any more updates there until we have more news to tell.

First Aid course: We have been talking to the Orkney College around the possibility of offering full day first aid courses on Shapinsay. June Bacon leads on these courses at the college and may be able to do one over a couple of evenings. This comes at a cost of £110 each, but SWAP would fund 60% of that, leaving £44 for individuals to pay. If we can get 10 people interested in a full day first aid course, we can book it to run on the island. If interested, message (Lisa-Marie) boathouse@shapinsay.org.uk

<u>Smithy news:</u> We are spending the first part of the year upskilling our staff, with Barista training having already taken place, hopefully you will notice a difference in your coffees! We would like to invite tenders for Garden Maintenance at the Boathouse & Smithy Garden.



The tender should include 15 full cuts of the grass on the land around the Boathouse and Smithy Garden, inclusive of the ditches and strimming where necessary.

The first cut should be in April and the final cut in late October/early November according to seasonal growth patterns. Any extra cuts are to be at the contractor's discretion, taking into account the growth of the grass. There should be a maximum of two weeks between cuts. The tender should also include weeding of paths. All grass cuttings should be removed by the contractor and all hard surfaces should be swept clean after each cut. The contractor is responsible for compliance with the Health and Safety at work Act, including all personal protective equipment and must have their own insurance. The Contractor will supply suitable cutting equipment, ensuring that blades are sharp and properly set, to produce a true and even cut. They will also ensure that all persons operating the equipment are adequately trained.

The contractor should submit a monthly account, in arrears, throughout the cutting season for all works carried out
