Shapinsay Development Trust update

Charity Shop

Cast Affs recently advertised an 8-hour position (4 hours twice a week, ideally Wednesday and Saturday) but received no interest. Consequently, the shop will initially rely solely on volunteers while alternative solutions are explored. Lisa-Marie embarked on a fact-finding mission to Westray to learn how their charity shop operates and learned a few new ideas and pitfalls to avoid. A working group is being established, consisting of community members selected for their experience in running charity shops, organising fundraising events, and their knowledge of community groups.

Boat

Unfortunately at the time of printing there is still no update on the boat, which remains in Kirkwall for servicing. We are currently awaiting the coding checks and information of the necessary requirements to ensure it is seaworthy. The situation remains out of our hands for now.

Wellbeing

Alison is currently taking some time off and will resume all wellbeing activities in June. The men's shed continues to be well-supported, and we have secured funding for the group to visit Westray to learn about their shed operations, they met with VAO recently to find out about what is required to set up their own SCIO. Additionally, funding has been obtained for a monthly meal for members. If you have any wellbeing-based ideas for the island, please reach out to Alison.

Smithy

Starting in June, the Smithy will transition to summer opening hours, initially opening 6 days a week. A decision on whether to open 7 days a week will be

made closer to July, depending on staff availability. We extend our gratitude for the continued support during the winter and to our dedicated staff for continuing to work all year round, for committing to extra training and in anticipation of a busy season ahead.

We are excited that it's finally weather to have our marquee up in the garden, allowing us to accommodate more customers, including our canine friends. There is a bowl of water for dogs at the door of the Smithy.

Smithy residents discount

Residents can bring proof of residence (not all staff know all residents) to collect a voucher from the Smithy staff to receive a 15% discount on the lunch menu. Please present your voucher at the time of ordering to receive the discount, as orders are otherwise charged at full price at the time of ordering.

SWAP (Shapinsay's Way Ahead Programme)

We continue to support the community with Educational & equipment grants of up to 60% of any costs up to £600, community group grants and various other activities — check out Shapinsay.org.uk for more information (under the heading SDT and SWAP guidance). Quiet Routes – walking & cycling

The council's 2021 Orkney Matters consultation identified a strong community aspiration to walk and cycle more. Therefore, they are considering various locations to introduce Quiet Routes as a way of delivering active travel network connections rural areas, where segregated infrastructure is not feasible or would be costprohibitive. The council are currently collecting data to understand the volume and speed of vehicles as well as number of pedestrians and cvclists at specific locations. You may have noticed the bollards either side of the B9059 between Hilton and Manse Road - they are being used to collect information on traffic use.



Community Council members have asked for the results of the data collection to be shared with the community, and for *further engagement before* any decision is made on whether to advertise a Quiet Route in Shapinsay. Shapinsay Nature by Tim Wootton

It was a mixed bag of weather to start the spring off and a couple of early swallows were seen around the harbour by Sandy and Cat. Unfortunately the old adage 'One swallow does not a summer make' was evident as Spring took its time getting sprung. Of course, cold weather barely affects sea creatures and the local



'Orca-Whisperer' (Carol) again struck it lucky finding the pod known as 'The 27s' hunting around the Veantro fish farm on 27th April. She got the news out quickly and almost everyone, including Ella, got to see these magnificent animals. Except me! Definitely the one that got away. (photo of Ella & Orca – credit Carol

Watching birds in the garden is a popular hobby and the ups and downs of enjoying this was illustrated a few weeks ago. A moorhen (pictured below, photo courtesy of Christine),



an unusual garden visitor, turned up in Christine & Colin's garden, and Tash & Mark had a great tit coming to their feeders. Astonishingly,

this was the second time in four years that they'd had this locally rare species in the garden.

On the downside there was an outbreak of *Trichomonosis* across the island – an infectious disease mainly affecting some finch species. This is a deadly disease and the only way to prevent contamination is to stop feeding garden birds immediately. Sadly a number of greenfinches and a goldfinch perished. Hopefully that disease has now gone and I have at least one pair of healthy greenfinches breeding in my garden.

Eventually though, the weather did start to warm up and insect life proliferated. The first Red Admiral butterflies awoke from winter hibernation and migrant moths started to move north. Sheila found a 'Silver Y' moth and this heralded the beginning of an invasion of them from the continent. They usually arrive here later in the year so this early influx was interesting and provided valuable food for the local and migrating birds. Angle Shades are distinct and very smart looking



moths – Karen found one in her greenhouse and there was one in Sue & Richard's polytunnel. There was a Painted Lady butterfly here at Edmonstone last week too – another migrant from Africa. (photo of Angle Shades – credit Karen Evans).

Birds that migrate here in the summer depend on the masses of insects that thrive across our farms and moors, none more so than the hirundines, and swallows and sand martin number started to rise through April. Birds began to arrive at the small sand martin colony at Ness – this is always an uplifting sight,



knowing these tiny birds are returning home following a winter in Africa and several thousand miles of flight. (photo of sand martin

Also at the coast the Mallimacks (Fulmar) have been coming and going around the cliffs since December. They're sometimes known as 'Christmas Gulls' as they often return to their breeding cliffs in time for Christmas but they don't actually lay their single egg until May/June. And, of course, they aren't gulls at all, but members of the petrel family (like albatrosses). The small colonies of auks have been very slow to build although there have been the usual few puffins on the east-side cliffs. Razorbills and guillemots are often seen flying past in strings but they seem reticent to



come to the breeding colony just yet. Hopefully over the next week or so that will be rectified. (photo of puffin – credit Lisa-Marie Muir)

There is quite simply no-

where better to see long-tailed ducks in the winter and early spring than Orkney. The Peedie Sea in Kirkwall regularly has several hundred but here on Shapinsay we might lay-claim to hosting the largest single assemblage of these fabulous wee arctic-ducks at Lairo Water. Paul reported up to 1200 Caloo (long-tailed ducks) there a few weeks ago which led us to discuss how long these ducks have been using Lairo Water. If anyone has any recollections of when they began

gathering at this site that would be great to hear about. Of course, they may have been coming here since before living memory which would be fascinating to learn.

Arctic (and a few Common) terns started to arrive back on the isle a couple of weeks ago, adhering to Orkney folklore that the terns arrive with the 'First-fog of May'. They'll be setting up territories along parts of the coast very soon especially along the Ayre and other suitable shingle beaches. They always make a walk by the seaside wonderful – and sometimes challenging if you happen to get a tad too close to their nests. But two Little Terns catching fish at Elwick which were seen by Paul was a very interesting observation. These tiny seabirds are very rare breeders in the UK. There is a long-established colony of several pairs at the Fourth Barrier which is the most northerly colony of little terns in the whole of the UK. It would be nice to think we could have some breeding on Shapinsay one day - we'd have the record then!

Hen harriers and Short-eared owls are often seen here during the shorter months but this year sightings of shorties continue right up to today. Short-eared owls aren't thought to breed on the island so the one Tash filmed at Mill Dam and the one Carol photographed



near Whitecleat are most likely migrant birds heading to Scandinavia or visiting birds from the moors on Mainland or Eday. There is just a chance though that they might try and breed here – if anyone thinks they may have noticed breeding behaviour I'd be delighted to hear from them. Finally, one of the most dramatic ornithological events vears occurred Red-backed Shrikes are tiny but voracious predators, smaller than a starling. In the 20-odd years I've lived in Orkney I've seen only a handful of these wee beauties and never on Shapinsay. However, on 16th and 17th of May, dozens of red-backed shrikes arrived in the Northern Isles and the following couple of days fifty or more sites across Orkney and Shetland had shrikes. It's thought the total number of this species to have passed through the Northern Isles could be as many as 150. But still none had landed on Shapinsay! I admit to feeling just a little bit cheated that seemingly everywhere else in the county folk had seen them and now the birds were filtering through to Shetland

meaning they had flown straight over our beautiful little island. That was until today! A quick glance out of the (soon-to-be) kitchen window and I caught sight of an intriguing bird flitting through the shrubs. A quick scan around with the binoculars and then into view, the unmistakeable silhouette of a red-backed shrike. Finally, I'd seen one, and finally I'd seen one on Shapinsay. Even better – it was in our own garden. Birds migrating north try to stock up whenever they can to fuel their onward journey to their breeding sites and this little bird was spending much of its time catching and eating Silver 'Y' moths – possibly even one of Sheila's!


