Development Trust Update

Expert Community of Practice Shetland trip

The Orcadian contingent of the ECOP set off for Shetland last month.

The first night a few of us went to Bressay, which, although not officially part of the ECOP trip, turned out to be a real highlight.

In Bressay, which is probably the closest equivalent to Shapinsay in Shetland, we attended a public meeting on the benefits of community-owned renewable energy and housing.

Along with North Yell Development Company, we all shared our own experiences. The Bressay community seemed genuinely enthused and the atmosphere in the room had a real buzz.

The next day, we headed first for Scalloway which has a feel similar to Stromness with narrow streets and a cozy seaside charm.



The Scalloway trust gave us a bit of their history, outlining their achievements so far and their ambitious future plans to add sea defenses. This will open up opportunities for expanding their towns infrastructure which is currently constrained by narrow roads and limited space.

A huge challenge they are about to face is that UHI have decided to close their Lerwick campus and focus on Scalloway, which is currently not equipped to handle that level of transport or parking, so these possible changes are a big priority for them.

We were also shown their 5-star campsite at the edge of town, complete with all the amenities.

While they originally hoped for more, financial constraints limited them to two pods, with potential for expansion in the future.

After Scalloway, we headed to Northmavine, where Charlotte welcomed us and showed us around Bruckland (pictured).



I'd visited before, but they've expanded since then. Now they have portacabins/containers filled with various goods. They have one skip for metals, which they sell for scrap value, and another for general items. Anything reusable is set aside for donation, items suitable for firewood are broken up, and the rest is sent to the dump.

This is much simpler for NCDC as they are a mainland-based development company!

After Northmavine, we set off for North Yell. The journey involved a drive to the ferry and then a smooth, luxurious ferry ride over to Yell where we saw a peedie pod of dolphins as we arrived at the harbour.



Once there, we were picked up by a bus that took us up to North Yell, where we

were invited into their recently acquired community space - Sellafirth.

The North Yell team treated us to a wonderful spread of soup, sandwiches, cakes, and plenty of tea and coffee.

Alice talked us through their exciting plans for Sellafirth, where they aim to create a multi-use community space with offices and a training area, especially needed since UHI discontinued its outreach

programs.

Alice also shared insights about their community turbines—they have five of them— which we caught sight of on our way to the marina, the income from that is a real boost, enabling to take on large projects the impressive marina and bustling industrial estate, both of which are thriving. They also showed us a newly acquired house, the start of their journey to provide affordable housing in North Yell.

Afterward, we all headed back toward Lerwick and all met up again for a bite to eat at night.

Thursday brought minging windy, rainy weather, which made it easy to settle inside at the Isleburgh Community Centre, where we were joined by representatives from Community Energy Scotland (CES) and ZetTrans (Shetland's equivalent of HiTrans). Thursday's focus was mainly on strategy and updates from the Orkney teams.

On **Friday**, those of us catching the flight at midday detoured on the way to the airport to visit Bigton. Bigton also has an impressive community project housed in their local kirk. The community recently purchased the kirk, where they run various programs. It's a community venue with a stage for events, pews transformed into booth seating, so that on Saturdays,



when a local baker sells his bread and pastries, it adds to the cosy café atmosphere in the kirk. It's a multi-use space.

They also run a small charity shop, they don't accept clothes, if they do get clothes donations, they pass them over to the Salvation Army.

The kirk has become a vibrant hub for community events, art classes, straw-making classes, and after-school clubs.

It's clear that the community has a deep connection to the project; Many had a deep connections with the space having been married, baptised etc there and got involved from the start, raising funds to purchase and renovate. There was a feeling of strong support for the space and up to 200 people will visit the space on a Saturday morning and actively use the space.

Overall, it was an insightful and inspiring trip, with plenty to take back to our own communities!

Back home on Shapinsay we still have a fair bit going on too!

Balfour Cottages: You might have heard on the radio that we were awarded planning permission for Balfour Cottage at last! We are awaiting the list of conditions before we can move forward with the funding proposal, we hope to get that in before the Rural Housing Fund closes in 2025. After that fund closes there will be no more funding for community housing for the time-being, which is a devastating blow to many community trusts.

Solar Panels: You may have noticed that we now have solar panels on the Boathouse, we applied for Funding in August this year and were awarded funding from HIE and CES to cover most of the costs, leaving around £3000 for SDT to pay. The process was really quick from start to finish, including getting planning permission through and Deviate were able to fit the panels and an off-grid battery really quickly, before the weather broke! The off-grid battery will allow us to have a switchover option if we get a power outage, allowing us to have a space that will be warm and in which we can boil kettles to fill flasks if need be!

Community Ebikes: Unfortunately, the fund that provided grants for ebikes has closed, so we are looking into other possible sources of funding for more bikes for short and long-term hire on the island. Unfortunately, we haven't found anything yet as so many funds have closed for the time being. The first long-term hire period for bikes is almost over, finishing in January 2025, with phase 2 being a year behind! Remember you can hire an ebike for up to a week for £20 if you are a member of the trust, or for £5 per day from now through until the end of March. Just pop past the office to book it.

Car service: Car service continues to be run on a donation only basis, you just need to be a member (of the service or the trust) and pay £1 per annum. This allows us to run under a section 19 certificate, which allows us to pick up more than one passenger at a time and allows us to apply for the OIC Community Transport Grant, which could give us up to £10,000 annually towards the (ever increasing) costs of running the service.

Smithy: The Smithy will be closed for Jan/ Feb apart from Winter Warmers on alternative Thursdays, takeaways on a Friday night and the bar on a Friday/ Saturday night, we also hope to do a Burns night at the end of January, keep an eye on Facebook and posters for more details nearer the time.

Money: course from the Church

You'll learn how to create a budget, use credit wisely, reduce any debts and build up savings for the future.

Whatever it is you're trying to achieve with your money, whether it's getting on top of debt, understanding your spending or learning to have a healthier relationship with money, our free coaching can help. As a coach, I am offering to run a course in Shapinsay.



Cast Affs News

Cast Affs has been running for nearly **five months** and has raised an impressive £2,551.11 in total!

- £736.18 has been generated through raffles and baking, going directly to community groups.
- £710.37 has been donated to community groups from the sale of goods.

The rest goes back into Cast Affs sustainability

Trialing a New Approach

We've tried pricing and carefully labelling all items, but now we're starting a new trial: **no fixed pricing!** Instead, suggested donation amounts will be available, but pay what you can!

This approach aims to:

- Make goods more accessible regardless of income.
- Encourage more items to find new homes.
- Reduce the time spent preparing and labelling items for display.

Items will still be colour-coded to track how long they've been on display. Any unsold goods will be passed on to charity shops in Kirkwall or donated to the **Blytheswood Trust**, with transport kindly provided by **McAdie and Reeve**.

Looking Ahead

If community groups would like to get involved next year, we're ready to create a new list!

This time, we hope groups will take a more active role by:

- Stocking shelves and rails during their allotted period, but this could be done outwith the opening hours at a time that suits the group.
- Taking and sharing pictures of items for promotion if possible.
- If possible, helping with day-to-day running during their week/fortnight/month, but this could be done by the employee if time is freed up from stocking shelves

A Huge Thank You to Sally

Sally has worked tirelessly to bring Cast Affs to where it is today. She's now looking to take a step back from her role. If anyone is interested in taking on the role, or a job-share arrangement, Sally is happy to continue supporting on a shared basis.

This role is flexible and could be:

- 2-4 sessions per month.

Zero Emission Vessel Infrastructure (ZEVI)

We have received the following update from OIC's Marine Services and Transportation
Department: "The project has experienced a slight delay therefore crew training will be taking place in Belfast during the week commencing 16th December. This will be a mix of simulator training and on vessel training." To coincide with this, an online/paper survey will be drafted by the Transportation Service to establish demand and key timing points.

It is anticipated that the survey will go live from the week commencing 16th December and will run until the end of January 2025.

The EF-12 'ZEVI' vessel is booked to be delivered to Orkney in January 2025. During January to March, the vessel will be tested by local crew in Orkney waters to help establish what can be achieved from a timetable perspective. Following consideration of the survey responses and vessel testing, a draft timetable will be circulated for further consideration by the communities. It is anticipated that the vessel will come into service on 1 April 2025. As this is a trial service, it should be noted that there will be no impact to the existing scheduled service during the project period. The Electric Orkney project will provide additional services to the community over the trial period. Continuation of the service beyond the trial period will be subject to demand, proof of concept and budget.

Transportation

We have received an update on the process for setting air and ferry timetables as well as the expected process for community feedback. If you have any questions on this or requests for changes e.g. for a specific event, please contact Esther (Community Council Transport Rep) as the Transportation Department prefer us to collate community feedback/requests rather than being contacted by individuals.
