

#### **Shapinsay Development Trust update**

We held our AGM at the end of September and had a great turnout where members had the opportunity to feed into the Wellbeing projects future.

There was also an opportunity to pick up an annual report for 2024-25. They are now available to download from our website, or you can pick up a hard copy from the boat, the charity shop or the Boathouse.






#### **Primary Learning**

#### **Uist Visit – Rural Energy Hubs Community Resource Centre Project**

In early October, I (Lisa-Marie) travelled to Uist as part of the Rural Energy Hubs Community Resource Centre Project. I was meant to be joined by a small group from Shetland in Glasgow, but thanks to *Storm Amy*, they didn't make it down — so it was just me and Community Energy Scotland (CES)!



It was quite a trek: I left Kirkwall at 10am, arrived in Glasgow about an hour later, then had a long wait for my next flight — scheduled for 3:15pm but delayed until sometime after 5pm! I eventually arrived in Benbecula later than planned but just in time to join the CES team and Uist Council of

Voluntary (above Uist from the air) Organisations (UCVO) for tea.

Day One: We started the first day at UCVO's offices in Balivanich. These buildings were originally part of the old MOD complex and now house several third sector organisations. We first heard about a fantastic growing project that began around ten years ago, which culminated in the creation of the *Uist Growers'* Almanac, which is now available in the Boathouse Community Resource Centre.



Before lunch, we squeezed in a visit to Tagsa Uibhist Community Gardens. It's an incredible project, with everything

from bedding plants and a tree nursery to spring, summer, and winter vegetables. The gardens employ two



staff but rely heavily on passionate volunteers, who water and tend the plants almost daily.



families, featuring colourful recycled-plastic boards, some made from rubbish collected from local beaches.

After lunch, we enjoyed a walk through Langass Woodland, where we saw the ongoing work to make the area more accessible. There's now a new interactive play trail for

plastic display boards showing the sizes of some of the birds in Uist and right is the statue of the Hercules the bear who lived in Uist till 2001, and famously escaped in 1980 and lived wild for 3 weeks!)

We rounded off the day with visits to Taigh



Chearsabhagh Museum and Arts Centre and the Old Lochmaddy School, where we saw how they've used funding to create fantastic geology displays (*left*), interactive videos, and microscopes. By then, I was frozen to the bone, so I headed

back to the hotel to warm up and

catch up on emails before meeting everyone again for

**Day Two:** The CES team had an early start, setting out around 7am to drive down to Eriskay for the ferry to Barra. Thankfully, the SCVO ladies offered to take me so we could catch a later boat — meaning I could enjoy a leisurely breakfast before setting off around 9am for the long, winding drive south.

If you've never been to Uist, the islands are all connected by causeways. Most of the roads are single-track with passing places — and plenty of sheep! — so it made for an interesting journey.

The ferry to Barra felt like home from home, with ramp loading just like ours, except it had ramps on *both* ends (no reversing

required!). It was an old boat though — it made the MV *Shapinsay* look like a young slip of a thing!

Once on Barra, we headed to the UHI building to hear



about the dune restoration projects on Sanday and Barra and Vatersay. While CES went to visit the dunes, the SCVO ladies took me instead to Bùth Bharraigh, the community shop to see what they have achieved so far. It was worth the visit, it's full of refillables, local crafts, and even a small café corner. They then treated me to a scenic drive around the east side

of Barra, which was stunning.

Lunch was at Garadh a' Bhàgh a Tuath, another inspiring community-run enterprise combining a training café and community garden. The garden supplies the café, and both offer volunteering, training, and employment opportunities for locals.

No visit to Barra would be complete without seeing the



famous beach landing at Barra Airport, so the SCVO team whisked me off to watch the plane come

in — and CES agreed the detour was well worth it and came to join us!



After catching the return ferry, we landed back on Eriskay. Becky from CES was thrilled to spot the island's wild

ponies, and we were lucky — they obligingly came right down the road to greet us as we got off the boat!

We made a quick stop at the Eriskay community shop for some much-needed caffeine and sugar before heading next door to learn about Eriskay's ambitious project - Comann Eachdraidh Eirisgeidh (CEE), the Eriskay Historical Society.

#### Eriskay's Big Project

A bit of background: Eriskay was linked to South Uist by a causeway in the 1990s. When the local school closed and was put up for sale, the community stepped in. The Historical Society needed offices and a museum space, so they asked residents what they wanted the building to become — and the result is an incredible community hub project now taking shape. They've secured over £2 million of a £5–6 million project. The project,


underway) designed by a young architect, aims to be as close to net zero as possible. Alongside the museum and offices, they plan to include a community café, four wellbeing spaces for overnight stays (to provide income), and a community laundry, shared working spaces and more!


One of my favourite details was their creative fundraising — they raised £26,000 for a new roof by selling roof tiles! People could buy a tile, paint or write a message on it, and it would be fitted into the roof. Many former pupils and folk far and wide who felt ties to Eriskay took part.


After a bite to eat in Eriskay, we wrapped up the trip and got ready to begin the long journey home on Friday.
